Sustainable Planting

As you know from September's newsletter, we have been consulting with Dr Suzanne Moss, from the RHS about increasing the permanent planting in the village. This will reduce the amount of water we need to put on the beds and we won't be disturbing the ground and releasing carbon. This will make us more sustainable and help us look after this wonderful planet we inhabit.

Having seen examples of colourful displays that a mixture of perennial flowers, gasses and shrubs can create we have decided to make a start by completely replanting the two beds at the Millennium Centre with permanent planting.

Suzanne has been kind enough to walk around the village and make suggestions on a combination of plants we can use that will give year-round colour, suit the conditions for each bed and make a suitable habitat for insects and wildlife. We will gradually introduce the plants over the next year.
