# Wild flowers on the Village Green by Paul Johnson

For over 10 years the team have been seeding areas of the village green to provide a display of wild flowers. The densely packed blooms, gentle waving in the breeze, provides a burst of colour on the edge of the green.

A traditional wild flower meadow would self-perpetuate but as the village green is a multipurpose, amenity space, we have to reseed the area every three or four years.





The grass encroaches into the seeded areas and despite including yellow rattle in the seed mix we have to remove as much of the grass as we can each time we reseed. We were very fortunate this year to receive assistance from th Parish Council's groundstaff in preparing the ground

Before tackling such a prominent location as the village green, in 2013, we honed our wild flower skills on the bank in the parking area of Radford Park.



# Herb Bed revamp by Paul Johnson

Our herb bed, located outside Hiscock's in Midhurst Road, was established in 2001 and planted with 58 varieties of herbs, donated by Gates Nursery from Hill House Hill.

Although the soil was poor this suited the herbs and they grew very well, but after 6 years many of the plants were very 'woody' and past their best. The team have had a programme of replacing sections of the herb plants every 5 years, or so.

In recent years the bed has not been as colourful as we have had it in the past so we have decided to brighten it up with the addition of areas of wild flowers.





The muted tones of the flowering herbs will be augmented with bursts of red, white, blue and yellow flowers. These are from the 'Restore and Enrich' seed range from our seed supplier, Boston Seeds. They state that this mix will restore biodiversity and improve habitat in the bed using carefully selected <u>UK</u> native wildflower species.
